An A.A. meeting based on A.A.'s World Directory?

"Don't knock it if you haven't tried it," a Calif. G.S.R. writes us.

"The maps alone make the idea of 'fellowship' much clearer," he says. "And the 'Confidential' and 'Not for commercial use' explanations tell a lot about the ways in which the Directory can serve as a useful A.A. service tool.'

Compiled from Information Cards submitted by groups in December, the *Direct*ory also lists Loners, local Intergroups, Clubs, Area General Service Conference and Institutions Committees.

As the Fellowship has grown, communication among members and groups has come to be appreciated more and more as an aid to recovery, and the *Directory* is an elementary tool for making such communications possible.

THE 'VOICE OF A.A.' WILL BE HEARD

On Monday, Apr. 17, 89 elected Delegates from U.S. and Canadian groups start six days of sessions at the Hotel Roosevelt, New York, with General Service Board Trustees, G.S.O. and Grapevine Staffs, A.A.W.S. and Grapevine Board Members.

It will be A.A.'s seventeenth annual meeting of its General Service

Conference. Its job? To express "the voice of the Fellowship." Can it work?

Almost no one had any hope it would that first year, 1951, when 35 U.S. and 2 Canadian Delegates first huddled with the 15 Trustees, Bill W., and 10 G.S.O. and GV Staffs.

But it's now a matter of record that the Conference has done an amazing job of helping A.A.'s "carry the message" better when one drunk first sits down at the

bed of another, and warmly clasps his hand.

The 1951 Conference, for example, agreed that the printed word was a valuable sponsorship tool.

The books "Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions," "A.A. Comes of Age," and "Third Legacy Manual" resulted from plans at the 1952 Conference.

In 1953 Delegates learned we had 180 groups in prisons, 101 in hospitals, and (continued page 2)

What Happened to Joe....

That headline is the main title of A.A.'s newest pamphlet, a distinctly new type of A.A. literature.

The 28-page pamphlet tells in brightly colored cartoon style the story of a young construction worker and his family, his development of alcoholism, his introduction to A.A., and what happened.

It also presents 13 *new* questions about drinking (based on known symptoms of alcoholism).

The pamphlet is the result of many years' discussion of how to present material about A.A. in a "popular" way which will get read—especially by non-reading types!

The Literature Committees of the Board and Conference, and A.A.W.S., assumed responsibility for the final story line and wording, of course.

Each group is being sent a free copy of this experimental new tool for carrying the message. Do let us know if YOU see anyone able to start reading it, then quit halfway through without seeing how it turns out!

They shared experience about cooperating with other alcoholism agencies, and setting up local Central Offices.

Historical Moment

A.A.'s 20th Anniversary Convention occurred in St. Louis in 1955, and the 5th Conference met there.

Almost everyone in A.A. who cared, and who could, made it to St. Louis and heard the Fellowship roar its unanimous acceptance of the Third Legacy of Service, and the establishment of the G.S. Conference as the nearest thing possible to "the voice of A.A."

It's hoped this year every group's voice will be heard as never before as the Conference debates the merits and dangers in 1967-style "Sponsorship-the Hands of A.A."

The next International Convention of A.A. will be held July 3-5, 1970, at the Fontainebleau and Eden Roc Hotels and Convention Hall of Miami Beach, Fla., the G.S. Board's Public Information Committee has officially announced to the public.

The first such convention in the South, it will mark the 35th anniversary year of the Fellowship, which holds such a gathering every five years.

Some 4500 newspapers and national publications received notice of the Convention from G.S.O., with information about local A.A. meetings inserted in each story by P.I.C. volunteers.


