

A.A. GROUP HONORS DR. SAM

"This is Sam Shoemaker, the Episcopal clergyman whose teaching inspired the co-founders and early members of A.A. It was from him that Dr. Bob and Bill in the beginning absorbed most of the principles that were afterward embodied in the Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous." (from the book, "A.A. Comes of Age," available from G.S.O. and listed on the form enclosed with this bulletin.)

On December 5, 1961, the East Liberty A.A. Group, in Pittsburgh, Pa., which holds its meetings at the Calvary Episcopal Church, put on a banquet in honor of Dr. Sam Shoemaker. Dr. Sam is now retiring from active ministry at this church. The banquet was a sellout. The principal speaker was Red D., from Talbot City, Md. The following message from Bill W. was read:

"The streams of understanding and love that were gathered together by God in 1935 to create A.A. will always be the source of our infinite wonder, inspiration and gratitude.

"Some may say, 'But Sam is not a stream, he is just a great man!' But we of A.A. know better. We know that he is both. More than twenty-five years ago, he channeled to the few of us who then saw and heard him, the message, the understanding, the loving concern, and therefore the Grace that enabled our small band and all the countless thousands who followed afterward to walk in the Consciousness of God -- to live and to love again, as never before.

"On this memorable occasion, we of A.A. want Sam to know, as perhaps he has never known, the depth of our affection and of our eternal thanks that our Master did appoint him to minister to us when A.A. was very young and, with unsurpassed devotion, ever since."

A REMINDER - TAPE FOR LOAN

Tape recordings of two Catholic Hour radio programs (made in 1960) are available at G.S.O. for loan to any group. Both programs are on one tape. (We have eight copies.) The March 20, 1960, broadcast features two speakers: Marty Mann of the National Council on Alcoholism and one of the G.S.O. staff members. The March 27 program presents the stories of Tom and Jane, both A.A. members.

We will be glad to send tapes overseas if English-speaking groups want to borrow them. The recordings are on magnetic recording tape (1/4 in. x 1200 ft.) on 7 in. reel, and at 3-3/4 speed. More than a hundred groups have heard these tapes. If your group would like to borrow one, just let us know.

Our first meeting was held in Sacramento in 1958. We exchanged ideas for four hours. The minutes were transcribed and mailed to those present for further study. Each year we elect a different chairman and secretary and each year we meet with more enthusiasm. Our service committees (or office managers) have always recommended that our expenses be paid, and it has become traditional that we be alloted the time and money to attend these affairs.

"At the International Convention in Long Beach (1960) we held a special meeting where it was a pleasure to have Midge from Boston and Doris and Adelyne from New York sit with us. It is our hope that one day a great many other central offices will send their secretaries to meet with us."

AFRIKAANSE TRANSLATION

The A.A. Service and Information Committee for Southern Africa has sent us a copy of their new A.A. book. Translated into Afrikaanse, the book combines the first eleven chapters and thirteen stories from the A.A. Big Book with Bill's essays on the Traditions from "Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions," and some excerpts from "A.A. Comes of Age."

This project was first approved by the A.A. members attending the South African A.A. Conference in 1959. It was financed by special contributions from some of the A.A. groups in South Africa. Permission to translate and publish material from our Conference-approved books was granted by the General Service Board of A.A.
