

Thousands upon thousands have written G.S.O. about Group problems-and in 95 per cent of the cases of A.A.'s 12 Traditions. Since the Traditions were first proposed by Bill W. 20 years ago, and accepted formally by the move-

Who Are 'Trustees'

An A.A. newcomer heard some other member talking about the G.S. Trustees and asked, "Who are the Trustees, anyway, and what do we trust 'em with?"

As "trustees" they are trusted to see that A.A.'s world center of communication, G.S.O., really serves the Groups and other alcoholics. They are custodians of funds received, of the Twelve Steps and Traditions, and are the "legal guardians" of the name Alcoholics Anonymous. They have no power over any A.A. member or Group. They endeavor to keep the A.A. name from being drawn into public controversy, and to protect the anonymity of A.A. members everywhere. Our dedicated non-A.A. Trustees now consist of: Dr. Travis Dancey, Montreal, Que.; Dr. Vincent Dole, New York City; John M. Murtagh, New York City; Austin MacCormick, New York City; Robert W.P. Morse, Brooklyn, N.Y., Dr. John L. Norris, Rochester, N. Y.; Archibald Roosevelt, New York City; Bernard B. Smith, New York City; Professor Harrison Trice, Ithaca, N.Y.

A.A. members fill two kinds of 4-year trusteeships on the G.S. Board:

 "Regional" trusteeships, filled by six U.S.A. and two Canadian regions set up geographically.

Current "Regional" Trustees are Tom B., Winnipeg, Man.; R. Fay B., Bismarck, N.D.; D. Bruce M., Akron, O.; Jim M., Carmichael, Calif.; and Frank R., Lowell, Mass.

(2) "General Service" trusteeships, occupied by active A.A.'s with specific business or professional skills (such as finance, publishing, law, etc.), most of whom live within the New York City commuting area so they can spend the necessary long hours doing their volunteer chores for the Fellowship.

*Limited space; sorry New York A.A.*s! ment (as the Second Legacy-Unity)in Cleveland in 1950, they have been woven into the rich fabric of A.A. life so well that nowadays they are as useful as the 12 Steps (the First Legacy-Recovery), many members agree, and it would take a major A.A. revolution to change any of them.

Could A. A. Die?

If wholesale violation of any of them ever occurred, according to one A.A. historian, A.A. would perish forever-just as the Washingtonian and Catch-A-Pal movements did before A.A.'s time.

A quick survey of the most common questions we are asked shows these are among the least understood of the Traditions:

No. 7 (each Group self-supporting). We are frequently asked about a Group's soliciting or accepting funds from industry, or the public.

No. 5 (primary purpose is to carry the message), and No. 6 (no endorsement, financing, or lending of A.A. name to outside enterprises). Many book publishers want our "endorsement," and many institutions would like to claim they are "endorsed by A.A." There are no such things as "A.A. hospitals, farms, clubhouses, or retreats"-although of course many A.A. members cooperate in such worthy enterprises.

No. 10 (staying out of public controversy and legal disputes). Many lawmakers want A.A. on their side in political debates. Some professional alcoholism

scientists want A.A. approval of *their* theories and therapies. Even when many think these are all good things, A.A. has found it pays not to get on one side or the other in such matters, but just stick to carrying A.A.'s message.

No. 2 (Group conscience is our only authority), and No. 12 ("principles before personalities"), Most Group disputes and arguments yield to the wisdom of these Traditions. A.A. harmony (No. 1) seems to be too important for us to let it die.

The biggest miracle of all, is that BY FAR MOST A.A. MEMBERS ALWAYS OB-SERVE THE TRADITIONS SCRUPUL-OUSLY, EVEN WITHOUT KNOWING IT! Look at each one, and decide for yourself-during November, Traditions Monthwhere A.A.-and you-would be if there were no *Traditions*. filmstrips? The movie of 'Bill's Own Story?''

The new one-minute filmed public service announcement about A.A. has proven so popular with local TV stations in the U.S.A. and Canada that the Public Information Committee here at G.S.O. which produced the film now charges a reduced rate for prints ordered by local Central Offices, P.I.C.'s, or Groups.

One print costs \$20; the second, \$15, and additional copies only \$10. A recording of the sound portion only-for radiois \$5.
