GENERAL SERVICE BOARD AND COMMITTEES MEETINGS

The General Service Board held its usual quarterly meeting on Monday evening, Nov. 1. On the Sunday before, the Policy, Nominating and Professional Relations Committees met. The Finance and Literature Committees met on Monday afternoon.

On Monday morning, a regular A.A. meeting was held. The leader was Bill C. (Northeast region); the speakers were George G. (Pacific region), Beth K. of the G.S.O. staff, and Robert R. (Eastern Canada).

Some of the Committee and Board highlights:

- The Board approved Niles P. as a new general service trustee. Niles has been active in service work for many years, has served as a director of A.A.W.S., as chairman of the Board's International Committee (now inactive), on the P.I. Committee, and as a writing consultant on many G.S.O. projects, and on the yearly Conference Report.
- The 1972 Conference theme was approved as "Our Primary Purpose."
- The Board was informed that the new pamphlet, called "The Illustrated Traditions," will soon be off the press.
- The next World Service Meeting will be Oct. 5-7, 1972.
- A name change was decided on for trustees at large. From now on, the names will be: "general service trustee, Canada and general service trustee, United States."

World Directories: Are They Useful?

During the forthcoming General Service Conference, the delegates will be discussing our *World Directories* to help us to find out if there can be an improvement on their usefulness.

To make the discussion relate to current practices, we would like to have some facts. So, after reading the following, please fill in the questionnaire on the other side and mail to Box 459, Grand Central Station, N.Y. 10017.


Compiling the directories is an expensive, time-consuming service. Does their present use warrant it?

So far, directories seem to have had four chief values:

- 1. Travelers use them to find A.A.
- 2. For 12th Step referral purposes (for A.A. members only).
- 3. As a mailing list for A.A. members and A.A. committees of various kinds, announcing conferences, conventions, anniversaries, special meetings, etc.
- 4. As a handy reference for number and kinds of groups, group size and location.

Here are some problems:

- 1. Groups often fail to send in Group Information Cards on time, so directories are apt to be incomplete or inaccurate.
- 2. Directories carry full names of A.A. contacts, so they cannot be given to nonalcoholics, such as doctors, clinic and information center workers who need to refer alcoholics to A.A.



- 3. Directories are not meeting lists. Local or state meeting lists are available only at the local level.
- 4. Since the G.S.R.'s name and address is often the only contact listed for a group in the directory, its use as referral to meetings for travelers or 12th Step work may not be very effective.
