MEMBERS OF A.A. SHARE GRATITUDE FOR UNITY



As A.A.'s we are grateful for each sober day, but when Thanks-giving rolls around, each November, a month which has become, traditionally, "Gratitude Month" or "Traditions Month" for A.A.'s everywhere, we experience an especially deep sense of thankfulness for A.A. and the dividends

that our A. A. brand of sobriety has brought to us.

A.A. Tradition, which, as Bill has said in "Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions" has been hammered out on the anvil of experience, has meant our A.A. unity. It's good to remind ourselves that "the unity of A.A. is the nost cherished quality our Society has." And, to quote again from the book "Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions":

"The A.A. member has to conform to the principles of recovery. His life actually depends upon obedience to spiritual principles. If he deviates too far, the penalty is sure and swift; he sickens and dies. At first he goes along because he must, but later he discovers a way of life he really wants to live. Moreover, he

A MESSAGE FROM ARCHIBALD B. ROOSEVELT

A letter from Archibald B. Roosevelt was sent to you with the last issue of the "Exchange Bulletin." You'll remember that our good friend, Archie, treasurer of the General Service Board, reminded us that it was Fall contribution time. He told us that G.S.O. is now serving more than 10,000 groups, and that your service office needs to be self-supporting as it is supported solely through your contributions. Of course, the only way that this can happen is for A.A. groups and members to assume the responsibility of maintaining their own international service office. To this end, you'll find an envelope enclosed to make it easy to send in your contribution so that G.S.O. can meet its budget, only one-third of which had been received in the first six months of 1963.

finds he cannot keep this priceless gift unless he gives it away. Neither he nor anybody else can survive unless he carries the A.A. message. The moment this Twelfth Step work forms a group, another discovery is made – that most individuals cannot recover unless there is a group. Realization dawns that he is but a small part of a great whole; that no personal sacrifice is too great for preservation of the Fellowship. He learns that the clamor of desires and ambitions within him must be silenced whenever these could damage the group. It becomes plain that the group must survive or the individual will not."

Let's be grateful on this Thanksgiving day not only for our sobriety but for our unity which, as expressed in our Traditions, bind us together in preserving "the principles through which A.A. itself may survive."

A.A.'S POSITION IN THE FIELD OF ALCOHOLISM

To clarify A.A.'s position in the field of alcoholism, our hardworking Public Information Committee has worked out the following statement, which has been approved by all concerned:

Alcoholics Anonymous is a worldwide fellowship of recovered alcoholics who help each other maintain sobriety and who offer to share their recovery experience freely with other men and women who may have a drinking problem. A.A. members are distinctive in their acceptance of all or part of a program of Twelve Suggested Steps designed for personal recovery from alcoholism.

The Fellowship functions through more than 10,000 local groups in 80 countries. Several hundred thousand alcoholics have achieved sobriety in A. A., but members recognize that their program is not always effective with all alcoholics and that some may require professional counseling or treatment.

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A. A. is concerned solely with the personal recovery and continued sobriety of individual alcoholics who turn to the Fellowship for help. The movement does not engage in the fields of alcoholism research, treatment, education or propaganda in any form, although members may participate in such activities as individuals.

The movement has adopted a policy of "cooperation but nonaffiliation" with other organizations concerned with the problem of alcoholism.

Traditionally, Alcoholics Anonymous does not accept or seek financial support from outside sources and members preserve personal anonymity in print and broadcast media and otherwise at the public level.

QUESTION-AND-ANSWER MEETING

The Russellville Group has shared an idea they are using for a Question—and—Answer Meeting. They plan to hold these periodically. They tell us:

Here is how it works:

A Question-Box is placed in the Meeting Hall. For any question, or any problem to be discussed, a note is dropped in the box. No signature is required. A sample question:

"Should I tell my employer about my affiliation with A.A.?" At the next Question-and-Answer Meeting, the Chairman opens the box and reads the question. A discussion follows, and each person who has asked a question has the opportunity of getting varied opinions.

This same question happens to be one that is often asked in correspondence here at G.S.O. Of course there is no cut-and-dried answer, but it might be helpful to share various opinions about it. What do you think? We'll share your ideas in the next issue of the "Exchange Bulletin."

Helping a new woman member? If so, you may not know of the two pamphlets especially designed for the alcoholic woman that are available at G.S.O. They are:



A.A. INFORMATIONEN_DER DEUTCHSPRACHIGEN GRUPPEN

That's the name of the German "Information Bulletin," which is distributed monthly to all German members who request it. It's a joint effort of the German speaking groups in Austria, Switzerland and Germany. (If anyone is interested in subscribing, let us know and we'll pass the information on, as we cannot give you the address, since it involves using full names.) The October issue had a wonderful story of the European Round-up, which is held yearly in Weisbaden. Translation:

"Everywhere beaming faces; at the beginning conversation suffered from language difficulties and that was still the case at the afternoon meeting, but soon thereafter interpreters were available and everything ran smoothly.

"At 2 P.M. we met for the first public meeting, appr. 130 persons, lectern, microphone, amplifier. A secretary spoke words of welcome and on A.A. in general terms, and five alcoholics from the United States told their life story. Soon one finds out that neither country nor position change anything in our common disease, problems and symptoms are generally the same.

"Through our A.A. friend in Wiesbaden we were able to arrange a meeting for the German speaking A.A.'s at the Hessenhaus where the printing, buying and distributing of literature should be clarified. It was agreed that the committee should consist of Johannes for Western Germany, Helnz and Ernst provisionally for Southern Germany, Bruno for Berlin, Olga for Austria and Gustav for Switzerland.

"At the conclusion of my report I would like to express to our American friends, on behalf of all alcoholics, our gratitude for this well-organized round-up. For myself, it was a great experience, only made possible through the spreading of the A.A. program by our American friends in Germany which made it possible for me to write this and be no longer a compulsory drinker who has to spend his life in a sanitarium."

GERMAN BOOK AVAILABLE

The first eleven chapters of the Big Book, "Alcoholics Anonymous," is now available in German. It consists of the text of the book, without the stories.* A mailing of a copy of this book and also a German translation of the pamphlet, "The Fellowship of A.A.," has gone out to all German-speaking groups in Austria and Switzerland as well as Germany. You can order a copy through G.S.O. The price is \$1.75.

*Eventually, stories of German-speaking A.A.'s will be added.
