IN MEMORIAM

G. W. of Chappaqua, N. Y., volunteer editor of The Grapevine many years and always editor of its "Anecdote Bin," died suddenly in August.

FRANK AMOS, one of the original nonalcoholic incorporators of our first General Service Board (back in 1938), died in Chesterfield, Ind., in August. He was 83 years old and lived in St. Petersburg, Fla. He was publisher of the Cambridge (Ohio) Jeffersonian until he retired in 1952.

MONEY AND A.A.

"Money is a fact of life A.A. members can't dodge," an Oklahoma member writes us, "any more than they can dodge the fact that booze and bars still exist. I think in our meetings we should not clam up on money, but discuss it freely."

Apparently, many other members agree. As one from Connecticut put it, "Some of the best help I have got in my sobriety are Group discussions on how to devote all of life to chasing dough; and how contributions are needed in A.A. for coffee, meeting-place, rent, literature postage, etc. If we are going to act responsibly, surely we in A.A. have to grow up enough to discuss these facts realistically."

OUR 30th ANNIVERSARY DECLARATION



is one of the world's foremost experts on addictions. He is a professor and senior physician at the Rockefeller Institute Hospital, and a well known author. He got his medical degree from Harvard Medical School, and his B.A. from Stanford University.

ROBERT W. P. MORSE, Oyster Bay, N. Y., is executive vice president and treasurer of the Dime Savings Bank of Brooklyn. Born in Nova Scotia, he became a U. S. citizen in 1921.


"I'm sending along seven bucks this year. Each year in A.A. gets better. I'm a grateful alcoholic, thanks to you folks for keeping me in touch around the world."

There are 12 times as many Groups today as in 1945. The number of services has increased greatly, too, in the same period. Today, however, there are 294 Groups for each G.S.O. employee, compared with only 98 in 1945.

HOW TO HELP A.A.'s BEHIND WALLS

Over 37,000 A.A. members are locked up behind the bars of correctional facilities, hospitals, and rehabilitation centers. Almost none of them can buy the A.A. literature he needs to while away the long lonely hours; almost none of them can make casual phone calls to a sponsor, or get out to go to meetings the night he or she needs them.

Now all of us not behind walls, individuals and Groups, can help change that dreary situation. We can show our pennedup brothers and sisters they are not alone or forgotten if we'll just send them some mail occasionally—especially the A.A. pamphlets they need so badly.

The new A.A. Directories of "Groups in Correctional Facilities" and "Groups in Hospitals and Rehabilitation Centers" for 1966 will be mailed out this November to all such Groups, Central Offices, Delegates, and to Institutional Committees.

ALCOHOLISM THE ILLNESS (20¢) contains three papers delivered before leading medical societies, clearly telling in everyday language how A.A. principles belp people to recover from this disease.

A CLERGYMAN ASKS ABOUT AL-COHOLICS ANONYMOUS (10¢) answers the questions most clergymen ask about A.A.

IS A.A. FOR YOU? (5¢) Twelve questions about drinking which show people whether or not they need A.A.

A. A. TRADITION—HOW IT DEVEL-OPED (15¢) What about Anonymity? Money? A.A. membership? Leadership? These and many other problems get thoroughly aired, and our customs explained—by Bill W.

"Thank God, I did not lose my family and although I am now poor and protected only by God, I was able to keep my sobriety.

"I kept A.A. firmly in my heart. Even though we have no meeting place now, I

travel to other towns to assist other Groups and exchange experience, strength and hope."—A. C.
